Now in its 32nd year, the Uxbridge Celebration of the Arts is proud to present the 21st Annual Uxbridge Juried Art Show. This year, we were delighted by the number, variety and quality of the works submitted. The artists took special care to make sure the photos of their pieces were excellent, which helped greatly during the judging process.

All of the artwork was so inspiring that it took the judges many hours to narrow down the choices to what we can accommodate in the Town of Uxbridge Council Chamber. Each work was considered carefully, and the resulting collection includes everything from abstract to representational, single medium to multi-media, heart-rending to whimsical.

This year's opening ceremony for the Uxbridge Juried Art Show will also feature an invited artist, Fly Freeman. The AVEC (Arts and Visual Enhancement Committee) sculpture "An Uxbridge Story in Stone" will be unveiled just before the juried opening ceremony. The sculpture will be located in front of the Town Hall, with the juried show just inside the doors in the beautiful Council Chambers. Also featured at the opening is the Children's Art Show in the Scribes Room.

We are excited to produce our second catalogue to accompany this well-loved show. I am privileged to have served as Director for a third year, and I thank the artists and committee members who work so hard to make the Juried Art Show an ongoing success.

Artist Statement: "vertigo speculation" explores archival photographs by means of layering and collaging various printmaking methods evoking patterns and colours represented in maps and legends. Each image has been re-created and re-purposed through the process of photo-etching on a copper plate. In turn, the etched copper plates are printed on different colours of Japanese kozo and gampi paper and chine-colled on handmade St. Armand paper.
"vertigo speculation" explores the notion of a

map of unknown relationships; relationships created by the viewer's association with the images.

Patterned Behaviour/ Hand-Me-Downs

photo silkscreen on canvas with tissue paper patterns 26x32

Artist Statement: Family relationships within the sibling bonds of four sisters are explored in this portrait composite. The portraiture tradition of external posturing is shown in multiple, repeated variations. Personal memories of behavior expectations layered with the desire for individuality is veiled and altered over time with the passage of generations.

Paper dress patterns are used as symbols to serve as handholds for reference and understanding of who we were, who we are, and how we interrelate within the puzzle of the family construct. Dresses hand sewn from the same fabric and pattern are worn for display in the posed group portrait again and again to denote the expected conformity of appearance and behaviour. The desire for individuality is suppressed and refuged from vulnerability within the sibling group. Paper dress patterns are layered with pocket openings to represent the veil of obscured memory.

The photographic process is used to appropriate family memories through digital scanning and to manipulate perception through software enhancement of contrast and halftone filter with the intent to express how memories change and become obscured over time. Anonymity of the subjects is created through the variables inherent in the photo silkscreen process, printed in complementary colours.

I also find it interesting to hear the public's opinion of the art form.



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

This painting consists of many layers, the icy sky and lake lay frozen in the background, while the viewer's attention is drawn to the lone pine in the foreground. The painting process moved from the heat of flowing paint, using a brush and heat gun to manipulate the paint (beeswax, resin and pigment) then progressing to

sharp details and contrast through the use of a hot iron and the addition of string and birch bark.

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

Artist Statement: This is a small version (maguette) of the monumental bronze sculpture to be installed in the heart of downtown Uxbridge in May 2018. It commemorates Col. Sam Sharpe, a local hero who succumbed to "shell shock" in 1918. Today, we know it as Post

Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), and recognize it as a mental condition requiring treatment. In 1918, it was considered a disgrace, and Col. Sharpe's name was buried for 100 years. This statue, and Sam Sharpe, has a message to us today, 100 years after his death, concerning an understanding of the PTSD issue

The larger-than-lifesize statue is being created by Uxbridge sculptor Wynn Walters. It will be installed beside the CIBC Bank at the intersection of Brock and Toronto streets - appropriately, across the road from the Cenotaph listing the battles he fought in, and from the mural celebrating his men marching off to war. The CIBC has generously given permission for this use of their land

There is a subtle message in the posture of the figure. Traditionally in statues of military heroes, a figure with one foot lifted off the ground indicates he died in action. Often in equestrian statues, the horse has one hoof lifted. In effect, such was the case with Lt. Col. Sam. Sharpe.

He died not in battle but of battle.



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INVITED ARTIST

Fly Freeman

AVEC (Arts and Visual Enhancement Committee) was formed by Uxbridge Town Council to investigate and map out possible areas of the Township suitable for works of public art.

Local artist Fly Freeman was selected to create AVEC's first major project: a frieze of four limestone panels representing the various phases of our forests. "An Uxbridge Story in Stone" spans the initial clearing of the land that became the Township of Uxbridge, to the reforestationthat has developed the wonderful trails we enjoy today.

The project is created from four 3'x2'x1' pieces of Indiana Limestone. They are assembled to form a cube measuring 3' x 3' x 3' mounted on a 3' high base. Images are carved in relief around the sculpture, as is the following text:



"We cut the trees to Build the Town that

Brought the People who Replanted the Forests and Made the Trails where now We Walk."

- Panel 1: Two woodsmen cutting down the big first growth trees.
- Panel 2: A wheel from a mill representing the growth of industry in Uxbridge
- Panel 3: Realization of the need for reforestation. and restoration of the land and forest.
- Panel 4: An image of the present-day forests around Uxbridge, and the families who are enjoying the "Trail Capital of Canada"



The sculpture has great relevance in this, Canada's sesquicentennial year. Of historical significance, "An Uxbridge Story in Stone" will serve as a focus for community pride and an inspiration for our youth.
